

CAREERS THROUGH MATHS: COMMERCIAL PILOT



JOB OVERVIEW

A Commercial Pilot is responsible for the safe and efficient operation of aircraft transporting passengers, cargo, or undertaking specialised operations such as aerial surveying or emergency medical flights. In the UK, commercial pilots typically work for major carriers like British Airways, easyJet, Ryanair, or regional operators such as Loganair and Eastern Airways, as well as freight operators including DHL and UPS. Daily responsibilities extend far beyond simply flying the aircraft; pilots conduct thorough pre-flight briefings, calculate performance data, review weather forecasts and NOTAMs (Notices to Air Missions), file flight plans with NATS (National Air Traffic Services), and supervise the loading of fuel and cargo to ensure the aircraft remains within its centre of gravity envelope.
