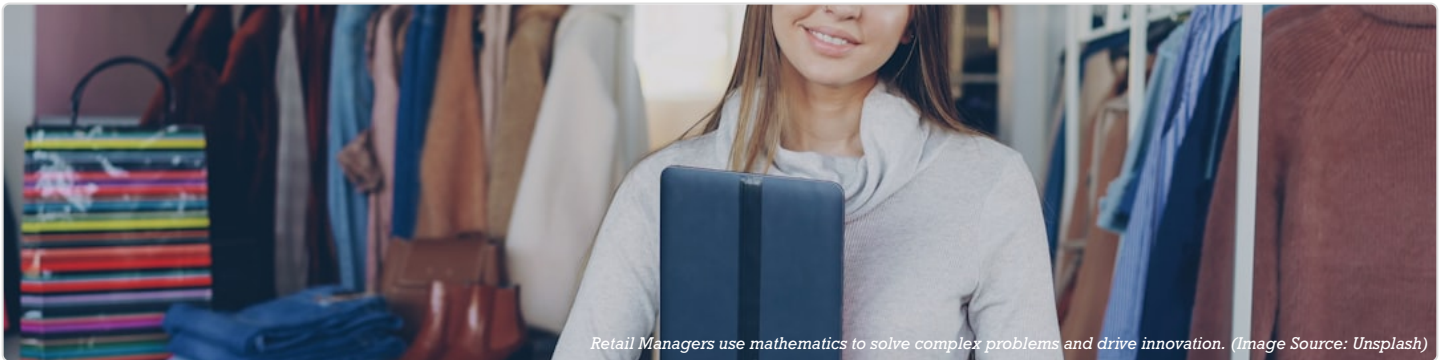


# CAREERS THROUGH MATHS: RETAIL MANAGER

## TYPICAL PATHWAY

While a university degree is not always essential, many managers hold a foundation degree, HND, or bachelor's degree in business, retail management, or a related field. Typical progression starts from a supervisory role (e.g., Team Leader) to Deputy Manager and then to Store Manager. Key qualifications include diplomas from the Institute of Customer Service (ICS) or vocational qualifications like a Level 4 NVQ in Management.

Demand for skilled managers remains steady, with a particular need for those adept at using data to navigate the challenges of online competition and changing consumer habits.
